Moose and bears are regularly spotted in northern New Hampshire, but rarely do people stop to think about what the animals are doing, how much room they need to live, and how we can best live with these animals. All too often encounters with the animals are simply fleeting glimpses in the woods or an accident scene on the roadways. This presentation will follow both species in a year of their life cycles to see what they are doing at certain times of the year, as well as how they interact with each other and with humans. Find out how to spot bear signs, like the bite or scratch marks seen on a tree or telephone pole, as well as discussing fun facts like bear nests and bear hooting. Also learn some of the reasons moose stay in ponds and lakes so often – are they relaxing, swimming or eating?
